

# NEWS FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL

Abbas Alawieh and Mariam Baydoun participated in the Generation of Promise program this past school year. Sixty students from eighteen school communities in the greater Detroit area participated in the program; Fordson was the only Dearborn school represented.

The goal of the Generation of Promise, established in 1987, is "... to provide cross-cultural experiences for students which will build bridges between urban and suburban youth," said Christine Geoghegan, program director. The program has students meet seven to eight times a year over a ten month period for a total of approximately 120 hours. ## The following projects were awarded funds last year

**January, 2007: First Team, \$2000.** As described in previous issues, this science and technology team works with a business partner and competes in regional, state and national robotics competitions. The team sponsor and team members have worked diligently during the school year and the summer to raise funds for FIRST. Some entry fees plus transportation and housing are as much as \$10,000. We feature team members on the cover of this issue.

March, 2007: Trip to Autorama for advanced Auto Tech students, \$650.

**May, 2007: \$200** for an ice machine for the nurse's office. This gift was acknowledged with a written note of thanks by Mrs. Mary Baker, the school nurse.

At the November, 2007 meeting of the Board of Directors, the Board heard requests for funding. Mrs. Roxanne Crabill of the Science Department requested \$1200 for a DVD Physics course for students with weaker math skills. This will supplement a new set of texts purchased by the school for use with some 700 plus students. Ms. Diane Prieur of the English Department asked for \$500 for the purchase of costumes for a Renaissance Festival. Both requests were approved, as was a request for funding for the 25 member First team, 2007-2008 competitions. The Board approved \$1500.

Another notable grad: The name and biography of John C. Kornblum, U.S. Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany, can be found on the web site of the Department of State, United States of America. Following his graduation from Michigan State University, John Kornblum began his career in the United States Foreign Service in 1964. Between 1969 and 1981 he served primarily in Hamburg, Berlin and Washington. In 1987 he was chosen to be the U. S. Deputy Permanent Representative to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Brussels. After his appointment as Ambassador to the Conference on Security and Cooperation (1991) by President Bush, he was instrumental in drafting the Declaration approved at the Helsinki Summit. He served as Ambassador to Germany from 1997-2001. In 1996 he received the highest award of an American foreign service officer from the Federal Republic of Germany. He has authored a book, *The German Element*. He is married to Helen Sen; the couple has two sons.

### **IN MEMORIAM**



He received numerous awards for his research on the relationship between the brain, heart and immune system and his ground-breaking research on heart transplant recipients receiving the memories of their donor led to the formation of the

Cleveland Clinic's new Heart/Mind Program." We received this note from 1937 grad Bob Bennett along with a graduation day picture with two friends, Harold Lance and Albert Catalo. "May 19, 2007: Harold Lance was the brain of the bunch and was soon involved in design work. I went to Fords. My dad Bert Bennett was the painter boss in the powerhouse. I don't remember where Al Catalo worked. We were both members of the Michigan Air National Guard and we both (were) called to duty Oct. 15, 1940. Al went to another unit and I remained in the photo section. We were sent to Alexandria, LA to map all the camp that was being built. I stayed with the 107th National Guard until Sept 1942 when I went to pilot training. I continued in training until I went to B24 Bomb training. My training was completed. I was promoted to First Lieutenant and was given a new B24 Liberator. I flew 31 missions and returned home. I went to flight instructor school and finish(ed) my military career. I worked 31 years for Western Electric Company and retired." Thanks for sharing your story, Bob.



FIRST team members **Mohamad Bzeih, Mostapha Bzeih and Ali Mokkaled** brought their competition robot to the Board meeting in November and demonstrated its use. We were impressed by the skills the boys demonstrated. Unlike most competitors, the team has done its own work and is one of the few, if not the only team, whose robot is student designed and built. Mohamad built the circuit board and Ali programmed the robot. The boys attended a six week programming class at Fordson this past summer. The course was taught by **Bob Kale**, a Ford Motor Company Engineer and attracted students from many school districts. Now the Fordson team needs volunteers to assist them as they prepare for their first competition next March 13,14,15 at Wayne State University. Our efforts to influence the renovation of the ceilings in A and B Halls have fallen short. We are disappointed in the choices of ceiling material and lighting and do not find the renovation in keeping with the classical style of Fordson. The renovation was awarded to the architectural firm that did such an outstanding job with the recent addition to the school. The A halls have dropped ceilings with acoustical tile. The work in the main B halls is even more disappointing. We understand that the district had two goals for the halls, to reduce noise and to improve lighting. The B hall ceilings were dropped about four to six inches; sound insulation was installed between the old ceilings and the new. The curvature of the original ceiling was followed, but aluminum strips run the full length of the halls. The strips are separated by small spaces. Light fixtures hang by wires from the ceilings (see above). They are also visible on the cover picture. Some members describe the hallways as resembling subway stations. We are including pictures of lower B hall near the intersection of the main gym/ swimming pool hall. We invite you to stop by the school and judge for vourselves. We hope to ask central administration to consider replacing the lighting fixtures with some that are more in keeping with the building's architecture.

### **ALUMNI NEWS**

**Homecoming:** Reunion classes met on Sunday, August 5 at Ford Field. Unfortunately, an all day rain greeted those who braved the weather. We heard lots of laughter as people shared memories of high school days. Members of the board worked the Association booth, selling tee shirts and other memorabilia. The Tractor Stop Shop, located in the first floor of the new addition to the school, now sells alumni shirts, etc.

Ismael Ahmed was recently appointed Director of the State of Michigan Department of Human Services by Governor Jennifer Granholm. Following graduation from Fordson, Ish continued his education at Henry Ford Community College, then the University of Michigan where he earned a bachelor's degree. He has long been a community activist, instrumental in the founding ACCESS, a private non-profit agency that helps thousands of people each year. His background includes service in the U.S. Army, assembly line work and managing a rock band! He credits his maternal grandmother, Haji Aliya Hassen, with his commitment to bettering the lives of others. Ismael has taken over an agency that has the challenge of helping even more people due to the poor economy of the state. We wish him well, and congratulate the governor on making such a fine choice of leader.

One name on the web site is that of **Dr. Alex Anckounie**. Dr. Anckounie received a doctorate in nuclear physics and engineering and was instrumental in the development of nuclear submarines. He was commanding officer of the U.S.S. Nautilus, the first sub to complete the submerged transit across the North Pole! He became a Professor of Economics at George Washington University and Georgetown. We continue to be impressed by the accomplishments of many graduates of our high school.
